EDITORIAL

John: Dr. Gaede, what is most important for good health?

Dr. Gaede: Good health habits are the most important for good health. These habits include choosing a balanced diet, getting plenty of rest regularly, and exercising properly. Our diet should include plenty of meat and milk with some vegetables and fruit. It is harmful to eat too much candy and drink much pop. for then we are not hungry to eat the other needed foods and it also develops cavities in our teeth. Getting plenty of rest regularly means that we should go to bed about the same time every night. School children need nine to ten hours sleep nightly. This means that all school children should be in bed, at least, by 10 or 11 p.m. otherwise, their bodies will not be ready for schoolwork the next day. Our bodies, just like engines wear out and get sick if we overwork John: Can strong drink harm us?

out-of-doors to play every day if the weather is good. Even adults should get out-of-doors at least a few times each week. If you do not work out-of-doors then you should walk a mile or so for exercise.

John: How do our body organs help us?

Dr. Gaede: Our body organs are like parts of an engine where each part helps the engine to run properly. We have many different parts or organs John: Will sports help your health? in our body such as the digestive organs which provide strength to our oddy; the sensory organs keep us informed of what is going on about us, the muscular and skeletal organs make it possible to react to our environment.

John: Why is it important to be clean?

Dr. Gaede: It is important to be clean to keep the germs from harming both the inside and outside of our bodies.

John: How do germs harm us?

Dr. Gaede: Disease germs harm us by injuring or hurting the normal function of our organs.

John: How is smoking harmful?

Dr. Gaede: Regular smiking of cigarettes is definitely harmful to the body. The American Cancer Society has published numerous warnings against the use of cigarettes especially during the past six months. In July 1958 Dr. Harold F. Dorn, Chief statistician for the National Institutes of Health summarized the death rates and causes of death among a large number of veterans. He stated that there was a much higher death rate among regular cigarette smokers than in non-smokers. Lung cancer rate for regular cigarette smokers was about 10 times the death rate of non-smokers. The death rate from coronary heart disease was 63% greater for regular smokers than for non-smokers. The regular smokers also had a much higher death rate from other respiratory diseases, digestive system disease, and liver diseases,

Exercising properly means getting Dr. Gaede: From the medical standpoint strong drinks certainly are harmful to our bodies and should be looked upon as a poison. Alchohol impairs ... thinking and reactions. It often changes personality from a pleasant person to an obnoxious person. Alcohol dilates the blood vessels and even raises the freezing temperature so that it becomes especially dangerous to be drunk out-of-doors in cold weather.

Dr. Gaede: Sports in general are helpful in maintaining our health. However, when we become too tired or overplay, it can then be harmful.
